VFW Elects Carol Whitmore as New National Commander

The Iowa native is the first woman elected to lead the 125-year-old organization

COLUMBUS, Ohio (Aug. 13, 2025) — Carol Whitmore of Des Moines, Iowa, was elected today as the new national commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), a congressionally chartered veterans service organization comprised of approximately 1 million eligible combat veterans and military service members from all six branches of the armed forces.

"Standing here today, surrounded by such incredible people — fellow veterans, families and friends — I am filled with a deep sense of pride and humility," said Whitmore during her acceptance speech. "This is not just a recognition of me, but of all the men and women who have served in our armed forces."

Whitmore's election as the VFW's 117th commander-in-chief occurred at the conclusion of the organization's 126th National Convention in Columbus, Ohio. More than 10,000 members of the VFW and its Auxiliary converged on the city to conduct the business of the organization, recognize individuals and organizations for excellence and to elect new leadership for the 2025 - 2026 year.

Whitmore is the first woman elected to lead the more than 125-year-old organization. She delivered remarks to those attending in person at the Greater Columbus Convention Center and watching via livestreaming video.

"When I think back on my journey, I am sure it was just like many others — my reality is not necessarily the VFW reality," said Whitmore. "But I was driven by a sense of duty, a desire to serve something greater than myself. And little did I know that decision would shape me in ways I could never have imagined."



Enlisting in the Women's Army Corps in 1977, Carol's 36-year military career was marked by significant milestones, from integrating with men into the regular Army to becoming an Army nurse, first sergeant and deploying as an Army Reserve nurse in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. It was there that she earned her VFW eligibility.

"As we look to the future, I believe that the strength of our veteran community is our greatest asset. We have so much to offer," said Whitmore. "We have lived through adversity, we have faced challenges that many can't even imagine and we've come out on the other side stronger. It's because of that strength that we are still serving our communities and our nation."

During the speech, Whitmore emphasized legislative advocacy as a priority for her year, with a focus on fighting to get Congress to grant concurrent receipt for select combat-injured veterans through the Major Richard Star Act.

"Through advocacy, our legislative efforts need to be resolute," said Whitmore. "The [Major] Richard Star Act must pass this year. This effort was started in 2004, and the bill has repeatedly and shamelessly been voted down. Let's get this done already. Honor the Contract!"

Whitmore also spoke passionately about the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) mission and the key diplomatic role the VFW played in Southeast Asia during the early 1990s.

"More than 30 years ago, it was VFW Vietnam War veterans who led the mission back to the country that cost them so much to extend a hand of peace to their former adversaries," said Whitmore. "This tremendously brave effort opened U.S. relations with Vietnam and access to the country so DPAA could find and bring home our comrades who were missing in action."

"I may be the first veteran to have been elected VFW commander-in-chief while wearing a dress ... the first female veteran, but I will not be the last," said Whitmore. "And as I have said while campaigning, I am your sister by mud, by blood, by dust, by dirt, by sand, by land, by sea, by air ... I am a veteran first."

Carol, a retired nurse, attended the University of Northern Iowa and Hawkeye Community College. She and her husband, Brad, reside in Des Moines, Iowa.

Lillington Post Commander Appointed as National Aide de Camp

Stephen Gardner, Commander of Ernest Simmons VFW Post 6722 in Lillington, received a letter from Adjutant General, Dan West, last week informing him of his appointment.

Gardner said "I'm honored and humbled to have been appointed as a National Aide de Camp to the Commander-in-Chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, Carol Whitmore. This appointment does not come lightly as this is the first National Aide de Camp appointment in our post's 80 year history and I pledge to serve with honor and commitment deserving of our eight-decades of warfighters who made 6722 what it is today.

We have come such a long way in such a short period of time with the help guidance of Veterans of Foreign Wars - VFW NC. Commander, Edward Beard, and his command staff; Past Dept. of NC Commander, Annie Cummings, and her command staff; and VFW NC District 7 Commander, Robert R. Kennedy, and his command staff.

Another first in our 80th anniversary year is the selection as a VFW NC Honor Post AND ALL-AMERICAN post. Thank you most of all VFW 6722 comrades, Auxiliary, and families for sticking by my side through thick and thin with positivity and purpose in seeing my Commanders Vision become reality. We could have never achieved this honor without teamwork and dedication displayed by everyone who loves our veteran community and families. I would like to say a special thank you to CommanderEdward Beard for placing his trust in 6722 and recommending me for this amazing position. "LESS TALK, MORE ACTION" it is, sir!"

Gardner is a hands on Commander, doing what is needed for the post from grounds work, to saving the life of a comrade with CPR at the post, both mere days before his appointment.



Marine Rides to Stop Soldier Suicide

A Stop Soldier Suicide Challenge to ride 300 miles in a month, made Gulf War Veteran, Tom Kopetzki from Cooleemee-Mocksville Post 1119 get up and go. But in true Marine fashion, 300 miles wasn't enough for him. Coming in second in the nation for miles rode, he totalled 1,671 & raised \$2,000.

On March 4, 2024 at 11:00, "Ski" as he's called & fellow 1119 Marine, Scott Burton headed out. Going past Nashville before turning around, they rode for 23 hours straight, 500 out, & 500 back, at times through snow. The other 671 Tom traveled were in part going back and forth to Camp Lejeune to visit with military, friends, & his grandson. His wife, Cheryl, accompanied him on some of these.

He said his favorite vest patch was the one he received for this ride. "When you get patches they mean something- this is near and dear to me- with more reason and rhyme to me for this cause." He got a lot of support across the nation, and followers on social media. People would hand him money to help with fuel or food expense but he would never accept it, instead directing them to the Stop Soldier Suicide Foundation website.

"I've lost people, then we have our own weaknesses and battles we fight....you gotta get it out. This is one way to funnel it, and two, to make a difference. Next thing you know, someone in Arizona had read my story as it was going around, and they were contemplating. They got help. It saves lives in real time, never think it doesn't. You know, I was trying to help those that came back from Iraq & Afghanistan, because they were struggling, then they still.... It makes me feel like maybe I missed something, that I could have done something different. So this, this right here I feel makes a big difference; you see, you gotta believe in what you're going after, and I'm going after STOPPING SOLDIER SUICIDE."

He encourages everyone to check out the Stop Soldier Suicide facilities in Durham. "They do this without medication. These are people who have been there, and gone thru this, versus someone who works for the government. They have programs to help you when other stuff fails."

"We're out there trying to save them from making a mistake. We make mistakes, and they see that, otherwise why would we be out here trying to help? Helping them, helps us, it helps me. The government isn't going to do it, so I will."

Motorcycle therapy is common among veterans, and Ski is no different. Getting on his bike is therapy, but this mission behind the ride, even more so. So what is he thinking about on

his Challenge Rides? I'm thinking about the people struggling. Riding for them

exhilarates me, keeps me going. They say the life you save just might be your own. Thats true."

As for the people who ask, "But why in this weather, what are you doing?!"
"Saving a life!" he answers back.

U.S. Army veterans Brian Kinsella, Nick Black, and Craig Gridelli co-founded Stop Soldier Suicide in 2010. September challenges include a 30 Mile Dog Walk, 90 Mile Move, and 100 Hour Gaming. Find out more at stopsoldiersuicide.org

Pence, Stein, Tillis Pay Homage To Sgt. Michael Verado

On August 26, 2025 Sgt. Michael Verado completed his earthly mission. He was 40 years old.

On September 2, the church bells gave way the usual hymns to playing "God Bless America" and other patriotic music, as the doors to the Weddington Methodist Church were held open by 82nd Airborne Governor Josh Stein had ordered all U.S. and North Carolina flags at state facilities to be lowered to half-staff from sunrise to sunset in honor of U.S. Army Veteran Michael Verardo. Weddington Fire Department's Ladder 41 waved a giant American flag at the entrance of parking lot. Inside, his wife, Sarah, greeted friends and well wishers. Michaels friend, Sean, took the family dog, Bravo, over for one last goodbye.

Verado served in Fort Bragg's 82nd Airborne Division. In April of 2010, Michael was wounded in an IED attack in Afghanistan's Arghandab Valley while serving with Bravo Company, 2-508th Parachute Infantry Regiment. He could have gone home then, but was unwilling to leave his unit, he asked to return to the fight. On April 24 he experienced a second IED attack that left him one of the most catastrophically wounded soldiers of the Global War on Terror. The blast took his left leg, shattered and shredded his left arm, and left him with burns and a traumatic brain injury. Michael should have died on the battlefield that day. When he was loaded onto the helicopter, not a man in his unit thought they'd ever see him again. He was labeled "death imminent" by medics; the crew on the helicopter took turns giving him blood trying to keep him alive long enough to get help. His wife, Sarah, said that day became his "Alive Day."

Despite amputations, burns, grueling recovery at Walter Reed, and 120 surgeries, Michael lived an incredible 15 years after his "Alive Day". Those years were spent with his highscool sweetheart Sarah by his bedside, whom he married in 2013, a union that gave them three daughters: Grace, Mary Scott, and Elizabeth. In those years Michael and Sarah fought for changes for wounded veterans. They even wrote a book called "Hero At Home" about how to view the wounds of our veterans with understanding and compassion. Years of meetings with Presidents, Senators, Congressmen, and Judges, their work also led to his family's involvement with the Independence Fund, pushing the charity into the national spotlight; Sarah is now the Executive Director. It also led to thousands of Afghan interpreters being brought safely to the United States, including Zia, Johnny, & Blaze, Michaels interpreters. Zia & Blaze were awarded Purple Hearts.

His fighting spirit, his compassion and his determination were repeated by the speakers at his eulogy. Jennifer Griffin, Chief National Security Correspondent at Fox News recalled "The image that will stick with me forever was Michael forcing himself up, standing to salute the flag on the day North Carolinians came out to welcome his beloved Afghan translator, Johnny, and his family after Sarah arranged their harrowing rescue during the chaotic and violent withdrawal from Afghanistan."

Senator Thom Tillis used humor to hide the pain of losing a dear friend. After stating Michael's only downfall was being a Patriots fan, not a Dolphins fan like him, he said "Michael was committed to his mission, Whether it was to get Sarah to agree to be his girlfriend, to join the Army after the 9/11 attacks, to survive after the attack and to recover, helping his brothers and sisters with the invisible wounds of war... Michael was always there. Mission accomplished, Michael." Tillis reiterated that Michael could have gone home after the first blast. He could have given up after being blown up the second time. "He understood that he had not completed his mission. I would visit him in the hospital, & tell him he had to keep marching. He soldiered on, & met the challenge, for so many people for so many years." Through tears he added "Mission accomplished my friend. We should all be thankful, that a man like Michael once lived."

Vice President Mike Pence, "We gather today to celebrate the life of Army Sgt Michael Verado. Karen & I are deeply honored to be with you today, as friends, to express sympathies and prayers to everyone who admired your brave Michael. Thank you for sharing him with our nation and for your inspiring dedication, leadership and compassion for veterans and their families across America." He recalled how meeting with them once, he bent to shake hands with a young Mary Scott, who looked up at him and said "Every time we meet you we have to wait and wait and wait..." He told the crowd that they made sure to be early today, we made sure to be early today." He told the girls their father was a patriot, who loved this country deeply. "But he loved you more, and I know you will always be proud to say he was your dad. To the families, I cannot comprehend your loss- thank you for raising a hero." He hugged the girls and Sarah, before placing a hand on Michaels flag draped coffin, with a long pause, and tears in his eyes.

Sarah: Michael would not have believed this turnout. I stand before you with a broken heart, but also believing unequivocally that Michael is whole and healed in heaven. This is hard to say, and it will be hard to hear, but the last few years, Michael suffered. He suffered and he stuggled every single day. He fought for every day, for every breath until the bitter end. He lived in chronic excruciating pain, and I take comfort in knowing he is in the arms of Jesus, and has been welcomed by his brothers that were lost in battle. Our girls, they have warrior blood, they have been called to leave this world better than they found it, and I cant wait to watch them change the world. He used to say "always, always" to me- he would write it in letters, send it in texts; The three last things I said to him were I will love you until my last breath, always, always; Every day will be a living testament to you; You did it, you fought the good fight, and you completed the mission."


Their eldest, Grace said "My dad taught me to never give up, that America is the greatest country in the world, and that the Patriots are the best football team" she paused to give Tillis a long side eye, as the church erupted in laughter. "Thank you for being my dad. I love you. I promise I will never forget you, and you'll be part of everything I do every single day."

Other speakers included Secretary Doug Collins, Dept. Of Veterans Affairs, & Alex Flernister, on behalf of the POTUS. Military honors were presented by 82nd Airborne and Indian Trail VFW Honor Guard.





Inspiring the Next Generation: VFW's Voice of Democracy and Patriot's Pen Programs

Since 1947, the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) has proudly championed two transformative youth programs that inspire patriotism, civic engagement, and leadership among America's students: Voice of Democracy (VOD) and Patriot's Pen. As the 79th annual scholarship contests launch for 2025-2026, more than 85,000 students nationwide will have the opportunity to share their voices and compete for nearly \$2.4 million in scholarships and awards.

Voice of Democracy: A Platform for High School Voices

The Voice of Democracy program offers high school students in grades 9 through 12 a unique platform to express their views through a recorded, democratic and patriotic-themed audio essay. Each year, approximately 26,000 students compete, making it one of the nation's premier youth scholarship contests.

T he 2025-2026 contest theme, "How Are You Showing Patriotism and Support for Our Country?", encourages young people to reflect deeply on what patriotism means in today's world.

The stakes are high — the national first-place winner receives a \$35,000 scholarship paid directly to their American university, college, or vocational/technical school. Other scholarships range from \$1,000 to \$16,000, with every state-level first-place winner awarded a minimum of \$1,000. But the rewards go beyond monetary prizes. Department (state) winners earn an all-expenses-paid trip to the prestigious Founding Forward Spirit of America Youth Leadership program at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania. This four-day immersive experience includes mock congressional debates, free enterprise challenges, visits to historic sites, and interactive educational activities — nurturing the next generation of civic-minded leaders.

Patriot's Pen: Cultivating Patriotism in Middle Schoolers

The VFW's Patriot's Pen contest, aimed at students in grades 6 through 8, complements the VOD by fostering early patriotism and writing skills. With more than 60,600 middle school students competing annually, the contest inspires young writers to explore themes of citizenship and national pride. This program awards nearly \$1 million in prizes across local, state, and national levels. The national first-place winner receives a \$5,000 scholarship, offering a significant incentive for middle schoolers to engage meaningfully with their country's values.

How to Participate & Resources for North Carolina

Interested students should submit their essays to their local participating VFW Post by the deadline of October 31, 2025. Each submission requires a completed entry form, available through local posts or the VFW website.

For members and coordinators in North Carolina, the Department is streamlining the process by utilizing the Scholars App program. Once your Youth Program Chairperson gains access to this platform, they can leverage the comprehensive Help Center, which includes numerous PDF guides. These resources walk through every step—from creating flyers and uploading student files to selecting judges and managing the entire judging process. The Help Center also provides tools for promoting winners to the next competition level.

Both the Voice of Democracy and Patriot's Pen programs continue to inspire young Americans to reflect on patriotism and leadership. With resources like the Scholars App enhancing participation, students and coordinators alike can look forward to another successful year of engagement and achievement.





North Carolina Native First Female Commander of the Military Order of the Purple Heart

Tracey Brown-Greene, a proud native of North Carolina, began her distinguished military career, when she enlisted in the United States Army. Over the course of her service, she deployed globally and served in combat during both Operation New Dawn (Iraq) and Operation Freedom Sentinel (Afghanistan). Rising through the ranks, she culminated her career with the rank of Master Sergeant (MSG). Her final assignment was at Fort Hood, Texas, where she served as a Logistics Manager with the 1st Cavalry Sustainment Brigade.

MSG (Ret) Brown-Greene's military awards and decorations reflect her outstanding service and sacrifice, including the Bronze Star, Purple Heart, Meritorious Service Medal, and numerous other commendations. She sustained combat-related injuries in Afghanistan due to an enemy attack.

On Her Journey to Becoming Commander of the Military Order of the Purple Heart (MOPH) "My journey began with a simple yet powerful statement from Past State Commander Williams: "I think you would be a good Commander."



Those words planted a seed that grew with every experience that followed. As the year progressed, I observed what true leadership demanded—dedication, resilience, and vision. That's when my personal mission took shape: To lead with purpose. To provide guidance, and to be unapologetic in advocating for Veterans and their families.

As the only woman in many rooms, I carried a sense of duty—not just to serve, but to be a light for other female Veterans to follow. The path has not been easy. Every step forward brought challenges. Breaking barriers require courage, patience, and relentless determination. Each year brought new obstacles—and new insights. With every challenge came growth. With every leadership role, an opportunity to elevate others and pave the way forward.

This journey has never been just about me. It's about what's possible when we lead with integrity, serve with heart, and open doors for those coming behind us."

She is a recipient of the Congressional Veterans Commendation (CVC) and holds a certification as a Master Life Coach.
