Ryan Rogers comes from a large family in southern Ohio. He enlisted in the Marines Corps in 2004. He did 5 deployments in his time, two of which were to combat. His non-combat deployments include an RFDf to Washington state, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, and to Bahrain as a Quick Reaction Force for southeast Asia. He was also a member of the All-Marine Boxing team for 9 months before his re-enlistment in 2009.

His combat deployments include once to Iraq as an infantry Squad Leader and once to Afghanistan as an infantry Squad Leader. Following his deployment to Afghanistan Ryan struggled with PTSD and TBI, ultimately being retired due to his Hearing loss and his brain injury, as he was hit by 82mm mortars in Marjah, Afghanistan.

Following his retirement, Ryan went to school and graduated Magna Cum Laude with his BA in Homeland Security, published his first book "Lions of Marjah", and founded the Choices Not Chances Podcast, where he interviews veterans about their service and their transition back into the civilian world. Ryan is a retired Marine, an Author, a Public Speaker, and an Instructor and Marketing Manager or Conflict Kinetics Corporation. He lives in Eastern North Carolina with his wife Leslie and their three children. Ryan believes in the veteran community and has dedicated his life to bettering the warfighter through training and transition.



Before becoming a life member of Post 1142 Auxiliary, Heather covered veterans events for her small Appalachian hometown newspaper, The Wilkes Record. She has won numerous prestigious annual awards from the North Carolina Society of Historians during the 12 years she was a reporter, the majority of these focusing on the local veteran population and their stories.

It wasn't until the swearing in, when Heather stood beside her grandmother & watched big name politicians from D.C. ask for her autograph & picture, what a history making hero her 4 foot 11 "Ma's" actually was. The bar was raised that day, & Heather strives to go above and beyond any chance she's given to make our veterans & their families seen & heard, never to be forgotten.

Tomb of the Unknown Soldier Visits Post 5352 in Kernersville

The traveling Tomb of the Unknown Soldier is a replica of the monument to American service members whose remains have not been identified. It is a 1/2 scale reproduction of the tomb in Arlington National Cemetery. The traveling tomb is owned and managed by the Exchange Club of Rome, Georgia, and is a traveling exhibit that visits different locations. The exhibit is free of charge and aims to honor the unknown soldiers.

One of their many stops this year included Kernersville. Post Commander, David Long, said of the event "As a Post Commander, our position can be daunting at times. However, there are moments where you are so proud of your Comrades that you can't put it into words. Hosting the half-size replica of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier was one of those moments. Countless hours of planning, organizing and coordinating went into preparing for the arrival of the Tomb which is based out of Rome, Georgia. Along with the replica, we coordinated with the Wreaths Across America mobile exhibit to be on display as well, seeing how fitting it would be, and it was phenomenal.

At Post 5352 in Kernersville, we have a solid footprint in our community that we have been working on for a while. Our vision and mission are not only to help and assist Veterans in our area but to strengthen the relationship between our Veterans and our surrounding community. So to be able to bring this to our Post speaks volumes about our Comrades at Post 5352 and how they have bought into this vision and mission we have."

Fourteen Battle Stars

I was introduced to Oliver last year and interviewed him for about six months. My uncle, Glen Edmonson, was the Gunnery Lieutenant on the USS Hughes, but he talked little of the war throughout my life, which is not uncommon for veterans of WWII. The photo from his wedding is attached. At his funeral some years ago, there was a full military honor guard, and it got me to research the ship on which he served.

My uncle only told me two things about WWII. Once, when we had just finished watching an HBO show called Kamikaze - The Divine Wind, narrated by Hal Holbrooke, he began to cry and said that had happened to him once. As he teared up, he could not say more but later told me that, because he was an officer, he had received a Japanese samurai sword as a souvenir but could not bear to look at it, and when he got back to Seattle, he opened up a wall, placed it there and sheet rocked and painted back over it. No one knows where that location is from so many decades ago, even to this day, and he was buried in Port Angeles with that secret. He never talked more about WWII with me.


After his death, I felt guilty that I had not tried to get him to talk more about the war, so I began this project. I got in touch with a reunion group for the USS Hughes and discovered that this ship was an unbelievable and untold story of WWII. It fought from the Atlantic throughout the Pacific and ended up going to Bikini Atoll, where they tried but failed to sink her with two atomic bombs. Unfortunately, it had sailors put back aboard her and spent some time in Bremerton,

finally sinking off the coast of California in October of 1948. Parts of the story are almost beyond belief, and some are very tragic.

The reunion group connected me with several daughters of sailors from the ship and Oliver. Oliver is unique, and it is impossible not to love him. He is a remarkable storyteller, and each time I would interview him, he would bug me to finish the book while he was still alive so he could read it. I worked on the book for a year and a half and was talking with a publisher, but they wanted another year and a half to put the book out. After talking with the family members and constant reminders from Oliver about his advancing age, I decided to self-publish on Amazon so Oliver could get a copy of the book.

I published the book on April 21st and sent Oliver the very first copy via Amazon. He received his copy two days later, I called Oliver and told him to go out and look on his porch, but he said, "I know! They delivered it today! I'm reading it now! Thank you, thank you, thank you, thank you."

I doubt I will ever sell many of the books, and I am just an ordinary guy, but if getting the book to Oliver so he could hold, see, and read it is all that ever happens, I consider the project a success. I am retired now. My grandfather served on the USS New York, my father was in the USNR, my son was disabled in Afghanistan as a member of the 173rd Airborne U.S. Army, and my

nephew was KIA in Iraq, so I care deeply about veterans. I was elected to the Washington State House of Representatives and proudly served on the Military and Veterans Affairs Committee. I a 25-year law enforcement Detective and retired in 2006 as the Commander of a 15-city Homicide/Violent Crimes Task Force. I live in Washington State near Mount Rainier.

There are so few living WWII veterans now, and we should treasure them all while we still can.

BY THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA

A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, a combat female veteran is a term that encapsulates the diverse and significant contributions of women in military service; and

WHEREAS, according to the United Stated Department of Veterans Affairs, there are approximately 2 million female veterans nationally and roughly 70,000 living in North Carolina, the sixth largest population of female veterans in the nation; and

WHEREAS, of the 70,000 female veterans in North Carolina, approximately 45,000 served during a conflict era, including service in conflicts such as World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, and more recent engagements in the Middle East; and

WHEREAS, on May 23, 1782, 21-year-old Deborah Sampson disguised herself as a man named Robert Shurtliff and enlisted in the Continental Army under the Fourth Massachusetts Regiment, making her one of our nation's earliest combat female veterans; and

WHEREAS, Colonel Lorna M. Mahlock became the first African American woman to be nominated for the rank of Brigadier General in the United States Marine Corps in 2018; Mahlock now serves as Major General, Commander of the Cyber National Mission Force; and

WHEREAS, General Ann E. Dunwoody holds the distinction of being the first woman in United States Military history to achieve the rank of four-star general; Dunwoody's career spanned over 37 years, during which she held numerous command positions, including Commanding General of the U.S. Army Materiel Command; and

WHEREAS, the North Carolina Department of Military and Veterans Affairs recognizes and appreciates the brave women veterans who have served our country with honor and distinction; and

WHEREAS, the State of North Carolina and our nation are grateful for the vital role that women have played and continue to play within the armed forces;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, ROY COOPER, Governor of the State of North Carolina, do hereby proclaim May 23, 2024, as "COMBAT FEMALE VETERANS DAY" in North Carolina, and commend its observance to all citizens.



THE LIBERATION OF GRENADA 40TH ANNIVERSARY

A true measure of sacrifice is making a difference that endures a lifetime.



Lessons from Operation Urgent Fury, the Liberation of Grenada, October, 1983 made fundamental changes to US military joint doctrine. The Rescue Operation that repatriated hundreds of St. George's School of Medicine students, faculty and staff and helped maintain the Truman Doctrine (keeping the Western Hemisphere clear of Communism) celebrated 40 years last fall.

The 118th Military Police Company (Airborne), 16th Military Police Brigade, XVIII Airborne Corps, home-based at Fort Bragg, NC followed US Special Operators, US Army Rangers, 82nd Paratroopers, and USMC Recon elements covered by USN gunfire and USAF gunships onto the "Isle of Spice" on 27 October 1983.

Nine members of 118th were privileged to return to Grenada, to participate in the 40th Anniversary Commemoration. Ceremonies were both solemn and festive. Camaraderie was everywhere. The Unit met with Gold Star Family members, the US Ambassador to the Eastern Caribbean, the Principle Officer at Embassy St. George's, SOUTHCOM Deputy Commander, Florida TAG (MG Haas was a paratrooper PFC on OUF), and a multitude of Grenadian VIPs, including the Royal Grenadian Deputy Police Commissioner who was trained by members of the unit during our return to Grenada in 1984 during Operation Island Breeze.




Calabash Post 7288 Presents Quilt of Valor By Frederick Walton

Students were surprised to learn that old and worn out flags are collected and burned in a respectful ceremony, noting the VFW, as well as the American Legion and Elks have special receptacles where the public can drop off old flags to be retired properly.

Discussed also was the proper folding of an American Flag, with 13 Triangular folds, each having its own, specific meaning.

The students were very familiar with the Pledge of Allegiance and the National Anthem. Cathy explained what the words of the pledge mean so the students might better understand what it stands for when they recite it in the future, and explained the history and meaning of The Star Spangled Banner.

VFW Buddy Poppy Queen and King, Scott and Olivia Bennett, who are also Waccamaw students, helped VFW Auxiliary members hand out goody bags with a small American flag and some brochures about what they just learned, along with a cookie. 
NGEL PLATOO
